

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



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Notes From The Director...

Whodunit? Where? With what?

There's something so fun and satisfying about trying to solve the mystery. Almost all of us grew up playing the board game CLUE. If you were not fortunate enough to play CLUE as a kid, you must head straight



to the store and buy the game immediately after watching this show! It's good, clean fun for children of all ages.

In 1985, a film based on the board game was released in theaters, and it introduced a crazy concept. Each theater was sent a print of the movie with one of three possible endings. When I saw the movie with my cousins in Ohio, I saw a different ending than I saw later with my friends in Florida. It made watching the movie multiple times fascinating and fun, and somewhere along the way CLUE became a cult classic. I think I watched the film with my kids at least as many times as we played the game around the dinner table, and we played CLUE a lot!

It has been my honor to direct the stage version of CLUE, turning our theater into a game board and bringing the pieces to life. Each of these characters is a bit over the top and on edge as they meet under mysterious circumstances on a dark and stormy night in a secluded mansion. Pay attention to every word, every glance, and every movement. Can you figure out if it was Professor Plum with the rope in the study, or was it Mrs. White with the lead pipe in the billiard room, or maybe it was . . .


Linda McClane (Mrs. White)

Clarisse Phillips (Miss Scarlet)






Trey Stafford (Wadsworth)

Linda Rogers

Once in a while, an organization has the right person in the right place at the right time. When that happens, it is a benefit. Linda Rogers was that person during our 41st season.

Linda is one of those volunteers unseen by the majority of people involved with ACT, because her efforts aren't part of any one production. Linda is in her fourth year as treasurer of our board of directors. Being treasurer is not just work hours, it is accepting the responsibility to

make sure ACT is financially accurate and prudent in its funds, ensuring that the board of directors and volunteers are watchful, and maintaining the requirements of our 501(c)3 status. Last season, when there was no managing director, Linda took on additional responsibilities that a treasurer normally does not do, such as checking invoices, paying bills, reconciling credit card transactions, and renewing licenses. During the pandemic, she closely monitored the bank balance, provided clear, concise reports, and held regular finance committee meetings. As we moved through the pandemic, Linda steered ACT back into profitability. She was instrumental in preparing the budget for our current fiscal year, and guided the board through the rationale for each number.

Linda also served on the search committee to interview and recommend a new managing artistic director. She provided valuable help because of her thoughtful preparation, her targeted budget questions, and recommendations for follow-up.

Linda, and her husband Dave, are long-time season tickets holders and donor members of ACT. They regularly attend shows and promote the theatre to others. Outside the theatre, Linda is active with her church and is an avid tennis player.

Production Biographies




Chris Twiggs (Director)

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
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
